The U.S. Food and Drug Administration does not regulate dietary supplements such as probiotics and prebiotics for the preterm infant, which can create a safety hazard.

Participant involvement in caring for their high-risk neonates significantly reduced maternal and neonatal stress in the NICU.

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Clinicians working in labor and delivery indicated a high level of readiness to implement a doula-hospital partnership program.
